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CELEBRATING FOUNDER'S DAY 2022

The similarities between Ireland and India are deeper than just sharing the first letter in their names or the colours in their flags. Eighteenth-century Ireland was a country occupied by an outside power like India and what is of even greater coincidence is that the occupier of both countries was the same. The British rulers who subjugated our nation were also responsible for the subjugation of the native Irish people in the times of Edmund. To top off the list of similarities, both countries were divided into two nations based on religion when they attained freedom from their foreign rulers. Thus when we talk about Edmund Rice and India, there is much that we can relate to.

Like so many of our Indian leaders, Edmund fought against the external rulers of his day in non-violent ways. He supported his countrymen and women whenever they were caught in legal snares. He rushed to their help by providing financial aid and legal counsel to those in need, besides using his networks as a businessman in getting their causes and cases heard by influential people in the circles of power. In addition to this, he gave up his own time to go to those in prisons and listen to them. When they lost their appeals and were sentenced to death, he would meet them and offer them the assurance of looking after those they would leave behind and he followed up on his promises. Edmund fought against the system too in getting schools approved for the education of the local Catholic children. Besides these battles, Edmund promoted Irish cultures and traditions like the local sports of hurling, Gaelic football and Gaelic handball in the Christian Brother schools as well as by teaching Gaelic, the traditional language of Ireland, in his schools. Edmund believed in freedom with responsibility for each and everyone and did everything that he could to provide dignity and equality. Although his main focus was to educate the poor and the Catholics of early 19th century Ireland, he did not refuse people because of their religion or financial standing and did all that he could to make each individual he interacted with feel like they were loved and valued as children of God.

As we celebrate 75 years of freedom in India, let us also follow in the footsteps of Edmund by treating everyone with respect and dignity, irrespective of their religious or cultural traditions. Let us give our very best to our nation and fellow citizens, for as Edmund said "Have courage, the good seed will grow up ... later on."

Are words also gender-biased? Can we use them indiscriminately? Let's talk about the most recent controversy that is surrounding the newly elected president "Droupadi Murmu". As we all know she is the first tribal and the second female president of India. The controversy started after Congress leader Adhir Ranjan Chowdhary referred to President Droupadi Murmu as 'Rashtrapatni'. The Leader of the Opposition called it a "slip of tongue," but the BJP accused him of insulting India's first tribal President. And while the political slugfest continues, the row has also triggered an old debate on how to address a woman President, particularly in Hindi. When India's first woman President, Pratibha Patil, took over the post in 2007, a similar debate ensued. Some had suggested 'Rashtrapatni' but it was rejected at the time. Eventually, Patil was referred to as Rashtrapati. However, women's rights activists have lashed out at the term Rashtrapati as they say it is gender biased and patriarchal. The word is considered to be one for a man because of the 4 letters at the end which are "Pati" which means husband in Hindi. Some activists have also suggested that we take up a "gender neutral" term for the highest constitutional position of our country, while many specialists say that since it's a constitutional post it is gender neutral. In 1947, this was even a point of debate in the constituent assembly where members had suggested other titles such as neta and Karnadhar which means captain. Then a committee was even formed so as to deliberate on this and give a written submission, which was rejected by Pandit Nehru and the term RASTRAPATI was finalised. But still, the question remains, is the word Rashtrapati really gender-biased? Or are we making it so just because of 4 letters?




INDIA, GENDER EQUALITY & EDUCATION


