GRAPHICAL ANALYSIS (BASED ON TERM-1 TOTAL) %



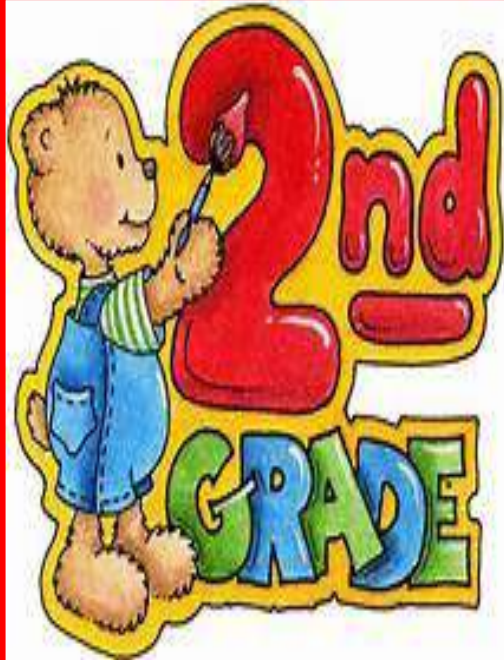

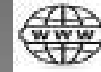

Some learners with learning gaps, emotional needs, or behavioral challenges receive in-class support from special educators and the counselor.



Concern - Denial Mode	Possible Reasons	Recommendations to Parents
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> When a child's behavioural or emotional difficulties are persistent, severe, or negatively impact their functioning across multiple settings such as home and school, this may indicate an underlying concern that requires attention 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The concerns may be linked to anxiety, ADHD (attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder) learning disability or ODD (<u>Oppositional Defiant Disorder</u>, a behavioral condition in children involving patterns of angry mood, defiance, and vindictiveness toward authority figures). 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Consider seeking professional support from: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - A Paediatrician; - A school counsellor; - A child psychologist or family therapist. These professionals can provide a comprehensive assessment and recommend evidence-based parent guidance, interventions, or therapy to support the child's overall development effectively.

Concern - Bullying

- Unnecessary **hitting** of peers and **forcibly taking things** from them;
- Deliberately **destroying or damaging** the **belongings** of other students;
- **Taking food or items** from other children who are buying from the canteen, and **forcing them to bring** things from the canteen for someone else;
- **Stealing** from others and **threatening** them if they try to report the matter to teachers or parents;
- **Frequently losing school materials** but actually **giving their belongings** or new items to students who are bullying them;
- **Snatching money** from other child.

Possible Reasons

- **Family stress**, inconsistent parenting, and **witnessing conflict** or violence at home, leading children to believe that **slapping** or using abusive language is **normal**;
- Parents **encouraging children to hit back** as a form of self-defence;
- As a result, some children find it **easier to hit**, punch, slap, pinch, or push peers **instead of expressing themselves through words**;

Recommendations to Parents

- **Encourage healthy social interaction** by inviting children at home and helping children **resolve issues through discussion**;
- Create a **lively home atmosphere** with a regular routine; meals together, talk and , listen patiently, and **use reasoning rather than reacting** with statements like “How dare that child do this to you?”;
- **Avoid immediately agreeing** with statements such as “My child cannot do this” or assuming the child’s version is always correct, as children may sometimes alter facts due to fear of being scolded or to please parents;
- **Approach the class teacher, school counsellor, or Headmistress, Principal** promptly if you feel your child is being targeted at school, in the van, etc
- meet them with an **open mindset**;
- Whenever possible, **involve children** in activities that allow them to help or interact with **less-privileged individuals** to build empathy;

Concern - Slow completion of work	Possible Reasons	Recommendations to Parents
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Slow completion of assigned tasks; ● Poor attention span and poor listening skills; ● Excessive talking instead of working; ● Not finishing classwork; ● Difficulty following instructions; ● Difficulty staying in one place and constant fidgeting; ● Not performing well despite attending tuitions, as reported by parents who say the child performs well at home. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Not being persistent in sitting with the child daily to revise the work done at school and making the child do it on his own. ● Writing the work themselves/or getting tuition teacher to write it. ● Unrealistic academic expectations, when parents or siblings perform very well academically; ● Differences in learning styles (VAKT-Visual, Auditory, Kinesthetic, Tactile), which may not align with teaching or tuition methods; ● Ineffective tuitions due to lack of supervision or mixed-age groups; ● Excessive pampering at home, leading to low independence; ● Irregular daily routines affecting focus and consistency; ● Learning gaps beginning as early as KG, where foundational concepts like basic letters or sounds are overlooked, leading to difficulties coping in Classes 1, 2, and 3 and reduced self-confidence; ● Neurodevelopmental concerns such as ADHD or Autism 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Limit screen time to 30–40 minutes per day, following age-appropriate guidelines; ● Refer to a speech therapist or counsellor if the child consistently shows withdrawal from studies or social interaction; ● Avoid negative discussions or criticism about teachers or peers in front of the child, as this reduces respect for school and affects classroom behaviour; ● Track tuition progress closely and maintain an organised, distraction-free study space at home; ● Assign age-appropriate responsibilities at home and offer praise for effort and positive behaviour

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Inappropriate touching of peers; ● Body shaming/ Discrimination / passing comments based on appearance, skin colour, size, social status or other physical features; ● Making fun and calling names without realising the effect on others. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Exposure to age-inappropriate content on social media, leading to curiosity and experimentation regarding their own and others' body parts; ● Unsupervised use of mobile phones or digital devices; ● Interaction with older boys especially in vans. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Help them understand how their actions affect others by encouraging perspective-taking, for example, "How would you feel if someone did the same to you?"; ● Teach children to say "No," respect personal boundaries, and report any uncomfortable situation immediately to a trusted adult; ● Sensitize children to respect and accept differences in others; ● Be a friend to your child by taking time each day to discuss school experiences, peer interactions, and time spent in the van; ● Where possible, choose van arrangements with children of the same age group

Concern - Throwing Tantrums/Fights

- Use of harsh or **rude language**;
- Anger and occasional **aggression**, such as pushing, shouting, hurting others;
- Physical fights and **lying**;
- **Mimicking** or imitating **fighting sequences** from movies or cartoons, pretending to attack or kick during play;
- Using **objects as weapons**, such as turning sticks or pencils into guns or swords

Possible Reasons

- **Problems during van travel**, exposure to **inappropriate or crude language** used by drivers or older children;
- **Desire for recognition** or attention, if not in academics then **seeks validation through negative behaviour**;
- **Limited parental time**;
- Lack of **monitoring of the content** they watch when both parents are working, as children are left with grandparents or caretakers,
- **Exposure to violent cartoons** and shows or fast-paced, colourful action that easily holds children's attention and **make them feel strong, brave, or excited**;
- Influence of older siblings, and **autoplay features**, which expose them to violent content repeatedly and unintentionally.

Recommendations to Parents

- Use **appropriate consequences** at home for the use of harsh or abusive language, such as withdrawal of privileges (**reduced TV time, outings, or favourite treats**);
- Model **appropriate language** by speaking in simple English phrases and being mindful of language used while speaking to employees or others on the phone, even when angry;
- Use **calming techniques** at home and **model calm behaviour**, as children tend to imitate adults;
- Ensure the child gets **adequate and consistent sleep**;
- **Reduce intake of junk food** and excessive sugary foods;
- Encourage **participation in co-curricular activities**, outdoor play, and hobby classes to channelize energy in a positive manner.

Let students be friends to one another, so that they create a culture of empathy, respect and kindness.
